Gum Disease From Kissing?

If your significant other has gum disease, check it out — you may be passing the problem back and forth to each other, warns the Academy of General Dentistry.

In a University of Helsinki study of 20 couples, researchers found that partners in four of the couples harbored the same type of bacteria that causes gum disease, a ading cause of adult tooth loss. This study adds to the evidence that

suggests adults living in close proximity may infect each other with harmful bacteria.

"It may give us a clue as to why some patients with gum disease become reinfected after being treated successfully," said Myron Bromberg, D.D.S., an Academy of General Dentistry spokesdentist. "It may become necessary to treat partners together for long-term results."

Further study needs to be conducted to determine how bacteria is transmitted from person to person, said Dr. Bromberg, who added, "it's probably done through kissing, not by sharing food, drink or utensils."

Couples should see their dentists regularly—and perhaps together—to evaluate their home oral care. If detected in early stages, gum disease can be reversed and teeth saved.
